



Dr. Jason Van VlietBIOGRAPHY

Dr. Jason Van Vliet was ordained as a minister of the Word in 1996 and served in two congregations: Vineyard Canadian Reformed Church in Lincoln, ON and Maranatha Canadian Reformed Church in Surrey, BC. In 2009 he was called to serve as professor of dogmatics at CRTS. His dissertation was published as, *Children of God: The Imago Dei* in John Calvin and His Context (2009) and more recently he published some study guides that are being widely used, Growing in The Gospel (2016). The Joy-Filled Responsibility of Teaching about Creation



If we stand and look at a mirror-like mountain lake... if we bend down and peer at a flower in full bloom... or if we just look up and (try to) count the stars, we are in awe. Our God has made such a majestic creation; words fail to capture its beauty. But how do we translate that awe of creation into effective teaching about creation? With all the debates about creation and evolution, we can sometimes shrink back from the topic. But this doctrine of creation is foundational, both for the gospel of salvation and for many subject areas that we teach. How do we fulfill our responsibility to teach about our Majestic Maker and pass on the joy of this topic to the students in front of us?

Image and Identity: Gender Questions and our Schools



The press and political agendas are full of matters pertaining to gender, homosexuálity, and LGBTQ. In that respect, we live in a different world than we did some decades ago. At the same time, there is nothing new under the sun either. These things are also mentioned, for example, in Leviticus 20, Romans 1, and 1 Corinthians 6. So what exactly does God's Word teach us about this topic? And, perhaps the more urgent question is: how do we approach this in our schools, in connection with both the policy that we adopt and—equally important—the persons who are entrusted to our care?

Learning Conversations in an Age of Educational Narcissism



The notion of learning for service is not a natural one in an age characterized by self-centredness. Yet in the context of Reformed Christian schools, learning for service is an important concept when we consider God's Word as summarized in our confessions. Are we not created in the first place "to the end that man may serve his God" (Belgic Confession Art. 12)? Confessing God the Father as our Creator, the Son as our Redeemer, and the Holy Spirit as our Sanctifier, we will reflect on what learning for service might look like and sound like in our every-day classrooms and staffrooms. Speaking and listening form an integral part of the language arts program, also in the Reformed Christian classroom. What are "learning conversations"? How can learning conversations help us counter educational narcissism? How might we practice such conversations?

Mindfulness: Promoting Silence in a Noisy World



Today's educational scene is a busy one, filled with new ideas, new approaches, diversity and variety, multimodal teaching and learning, fast-paced activity, visual impressions, and information overload. Intent on "covering the curriculum", teachers take pride in being able to distill major concepts into sound-bites. It is interesting to note that in this fast-paced setting, attention is drawn to the notion of mindfulness as a deliberate educational goal that requires intentional pedagogical practice.

In this workshop we will explore one example of educational mindfulness: practicing classroom silence as a way of creating an oasis of stillness in a noisy world.


10 | Mrs. Sylvia Hofsink: Workshop - Session #1




